The Hate Crime Unit's mandate includes:

To investigate, enforce and maintain intelligence files on all incidents of Hate / Bias Crime and Hate Propaganda in our community or produced locally on the Internet.

What is a Hate Crime? "A criminal offence committed against a person or property which is motivated solely, or in part, by the suspect's hate / bias against a race, religion, ethnicity, sexual orientation, disability group, age or gender."

What is Hate Propaganda? Hate propaganda manifests itself in many different forms, such as:

- A derogatory pamphlet, flyer or leaflet distributed door-to-door.
- Racial graffiti defacing walls, buildings, sidewalks, etc.

• Recorded telephone messages expressing hatred against an identifiable group.

Examples of crimes that may be hate motivated are: Harassment / Threatening, Assault, Intimidation, Mischief,

Extortion.

When should I report a Hate Crime? When you feel threatened or have been harassed or hurt, or your property has been vandalized by someone, and you feel these attacks were based on prejudice or bias.

Is the Hate Crime Unit open 24-hours? No. Call 911 in an emergency. Immediate assistance will be provided by a patrol officer. Call 905-546-4925 in a non-emergency.

Are the officers trained in recognizing a Hate / Bias Crime? HPS Patrol Officers have received training in identifying Hate Crimes through annual training. The Hate Crime Unit investigator acts as a resource for frontline Officers. Today, we have an improved understanding of the needs of our diverse communities. Officers are knowledgeable and will respond sensitively to Hate incidents.

Do I have to use my name in the report? No, you can report what happened for use as a statistic. You can even have a friend call for you.

What should I do if I see hate propaganda, posters or graffiti that promote hatred?

• Record all relevant information regarding the incident (name and description of those responsible, when and where the incident occurred, etc.).

• Incidents involving printed material such as posters / letters, should be kept and handled as little as possible.

• In cases where there is graffiti in public view, ensure the police attend or a photograph has been taken before removal.

• If the hate propaganda is in the form of an answering machine message, do not erase the message.

• If hate propaganda is hand-delivered, record a description of the suspect for the police. If a vehicle is involved, note the licence plate number. **Do not confront the suspect!**
